**A**s part of the ITAA's contract with Routledge/Taylor & Francis to publish the *Transactional Analysis Journal*, ITAA members receive access to a second journal published by Taylor & Francis. This is a significant benefit and one we hope you will take advantage of.



For the last two years, the second offering has been the *Journal of Human Behavior in the Social Environment*. The TAJ coeditors have decided it would be good to expose readers of our journal to a new one. They have chosen the *Journal of Progressive Human Services (JPHS)* because it offers articles applicable to the wide range of fields in which ITAA members practice.

The *Journal of Progressive Human Services* covers political, social, personal, and professional problems in the human services from a progressive perspective. The journal stimulates debate about major social issues and contributes to the development of the analytical tools needed for building a caring society based on equality and justice. The journal's contributors examine oppressed and vulnerable groups, struggles by workers and clients on the job and in the community, dilemmas of practice in conservative contexts, and strategies for ending racism, sexism, ageism, heterosexism, and discrimination of persons who are disabled and psychologically distressed.

## Update to TAJ Access Process

Routledge/Taylor & Francis is changing the way ITAA new and renewing members have access to the *Transactional Analysis Journal* online. To expedite the process, members will no longer be required to obtain vouchers. Everything else will remain the same. Thus, members: (1) join or renew, (2) receive an automated email from Informa (Taylor & Francis) indicating access is available, and (3) go online to register/access or just access (if the registration process has already been completed). Important: Members, please add "@tandfonline.com" to your safe senders list to ensure these types of emails are not sent to your spam folder or blocked by your service provider. And if you have not already registered and set up an online account with Taylor & Francis, we encourage you to do so now at [www.tandfonline.com](http://www.tandfonline.com). Just click on "Register" at the top right of the page and complete the details, which should only take a few minutes.

## Make Sure to Sign Up to Be Listed in the ITAA Directory

All active members can now register to be included in the ITAA Directory. Please be aware that although access to registration is only available to ITAA members, the list itself will be open to public view.

### Steps to Register

- Go to the ITAA website and log in to the members-only page with your login credentials.

- The new registration page will load and request you to fill in the information. Not all fields are mandatory. You need to consent to be listed on the directory using a check box at the end of the form.

To be eligible for nomination, trustees may not have already served two consecutive terms of office in any position on the board. Nominees are encouraged to read and understand these and the full nomination/election documents before accepting nomination.

Those who accept nomination to one of the above positions must sign the "Rules for Candidates Seeking Election" (see [this link](#)), which they

will receive from Julia Tolley and are also posted on the ITAA website. They must also email a written statement (maximum of 250 words) and digital photo to Julia as soon as possible and no later than the 17 January 2020 deadline.

**Election Procedures:** As per the ITAA bylaws, if there is no more than one candidate per position, there will be no ballot, and the results of the election will be announced in *The Script* newsletter. An unopposed candidate will take up his or her position following the annual general membership meeting (AGM). If there is more than one nominee for a position, a ballot will be sent to all voting members within 45 days after the close of nominations. The deadline for return of ballots is 45 days from the date of mailing.

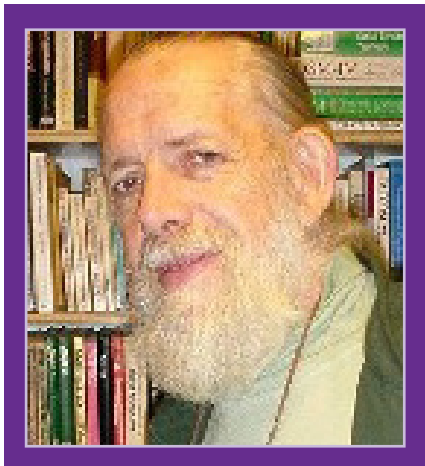

## Why Gay Marriage is a Bad Thing— Or Is It?

When my home country introduced the option for gay people to marry in 2001, as the first country in “modern” times, I felt proud. In legislation, lawmakers added that a “marriage can be between two people of the same sex.” Brilliant in its simplicity.

On 1 April, Amsterdam hosted a midnight ceremony for the first four couples. The wedding hall was crammed with the BBC, CNN, and other journalists to witness and broadcast the event.

I remember where I was that day: Harvey Milk Plaza in San Francisco. A gay rights group had put up big screens on the plaza, and a large group of people joined to watch the ceremony live. There were cheers and lots of bubbles.

Twenty-seven (only!, but still better than none) countries have followed so far. Gay couples can get wed from Argentina to New Zealand, from Canada to South Africa.

But there is something nagging me about gay marriage. And it is “gay marriage.” “Gay” as if it is still not marriage-marriage. Gay marriage as the marriage for the other people. I

certainly don’t mean we should all fit in the same normative mold, but words do matter. Calling same-sex marriage “gay marriage” still makes it distinct. It is marriage as well, but just not the same kind. It may be my own sensitivity, but to me it sounds less OK.


When an organization asks me to work for them, this is one of the first things I observe: What kind of language do they use? How do they talk about colleagues, other departments, the leadership and membership, their competitors? How do the subtitles read? Do they realize words frame the underlying meaning?

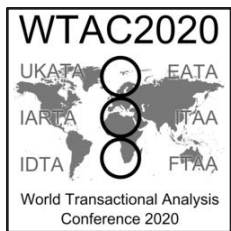
Words are not just words; they can imply a conditional stroke, challenge real OKness, try to hide a discount. Adjectives to identify someone or a group (think of “black,” “Asian,” “gay”) almost always need to be carefully considered for context before use.

But wait, one may argue, what if the term “gay marriage” helps the community to be more visible? Wouldn’t it help emancipate? I’m not so sure. To whom and with what frame of reference is the label applied? Narrowing “our” marriage down is still singling out a group to set them apart from others. I’m all for making the LGBTQI+ community more visible but not by giving them niched products like gay marriage.

So, I suggest that we stop calling a marriage between two people of the same gender “gay” and instead call it what it is: marriage. Include us in the world and language of the majority.

And if same-sex marriage is still not possible where you live, discuss it with family, friends, and people in your network. You can help make a difference!

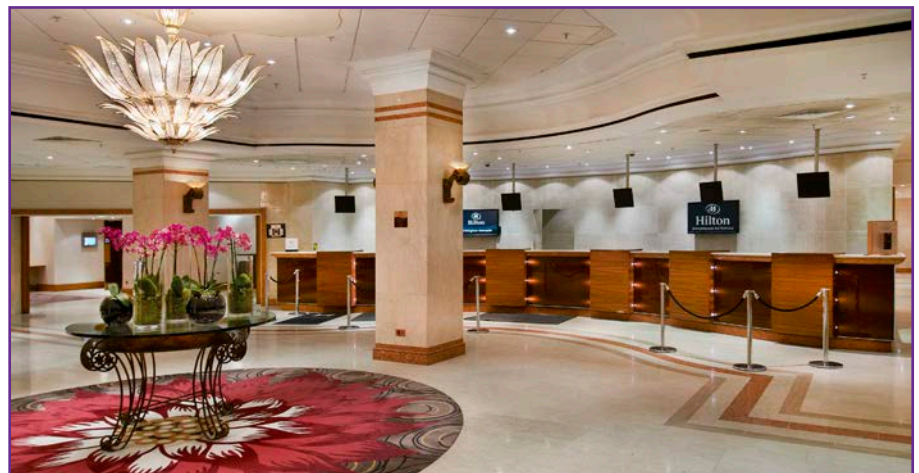
### Birmingham

With one of the youngest populations in Europe, Birmingham is a dynamic, creative city that is constantly evolving. It is a crossroads for culture, with diverse cultural influences everywhere. A vibrant mix of nationalities, religions, arts, interests, and ideas exist side by side in England’s second city. It is close to Stratford on Avon (home of Shakespeare), and it is also the area that inspired Tolkien to produce his *The Lord of the Rings* saga and the setting for “*Peaky Blinders*.”

Birmingham has a history of producing comfort food. Chocolate, cocoa, custard, and tea are all famously connected with the city. But there’s another side to this city’s food offerings. Birmingham boasts more

Michelin-starred restaurants than any other city outside of London. There’s a burgeoning street food scene too. Overall, the culinary cultures of 27 different nationalities are represented here. Eating out in Birmingham, the Black Country, and Solihull is like going on a gastronomic tour of the world. With the influence of Birmingham’s multicultural population, a must-try is the Birmingham Balti. Just a short hop from the city’s center is the famous Balti Triangle—filled with ethnic restaurants—which now attracts over 20,000 visitors each week.

In addition to the food options, there are many tourist opportunities, including a 15-acre botanical garden with lush tropical vegetation in the subtropical house as well as the rose garden, rock garden, a collection of over 200 trees, herb and cottage gardens, a museum, aviaries, the national bonsai collection, and a sculpture trail. Or you can visit the coffin works, where they made the fittings for the funerals of Churchill, Chamberlain, and the Queen Mother. There is a 200-year-old jewelry quarter that produces over 40% of the UK’s jewelry. The



Bournville model village on the south side of Birmingham was established by the Cadbury family and has an interesting Quaker history. You can travel through various chocolatey zones and learn all about the history, heritage, and current day workings of the world-famous brand.

### Visas and Brexit: No Changes for Attending Conferences

You may have heard that we had a general election in the UK in December, and the political party that promised to take the UK out of the European Union now has a majority in our Parliament. So, Brexit is going ahead. This will not stop anyone attending the conference. Brexit was about immigration—people coming to the UK to live and work—not about people making short visits. If you live somewhere now where you need a visa to come to the UK, nothing changes. Please note that you cannot apply for a visa until 3 months before your trip, and we will issue

any necessary invitation letters then. If you live somewhere now where no visa is needed, that will stay the same, although you may need a passport rather than an identity card.

We guarantee that, if you book to come to the conference and are then refused a visa because of any changes associated with the Brexit process, we will refund your payment—unless the refusal was because you did not meet the published requirements, such as no ticket home or having committed a criminal act.

### Weather

July is summer in the UK. Nowadays, UK weather is pretty unpredictable, but we do know that it is unlikely to be snowing! It should be warm, which means 12-21 degrees celsius, and it may well be raining some of the time.
