New Directions in Education, Accreditation, and Certification

Over the past year, the Professional Standards Committee (PSC) and the International Board of Certification (IBOC) have been engaged in ongoing dialogue about **the future of training and certification in the international TA community**. The ideas we have been exploring emerged out of an extended period of experience and reflection that has included the successful introduction of online examinations, the welcomed recent revisions to the *Handbook*, and the shift to a values-based approach to professional education and certification.

We are sharing our vision with members and will be seeking engagement and dialogue about key themes and issues later in the coming year. **There are three areas of development and understanding:**

1. Proposals for implementing values-based training, examination, and certification
2. A framework for understanding power and authority in TA professional education
3. A reframing of mutual recognition in the context of new proposals

At the heart of the matter is our commitment in PSC/IBOC to three core intentions:

- To ensure that our professional education continues to support the wider ITAA agenda for social change. This includes developing our arrangements and requirements to extend diversity and inclusion.
- To increase engagement by widening the educational “reach” of our systems—in other words, expanding the ways in which we acknowledge educational diversity in terms of learning styles, teaching philosophies, and educational frames of reference
- To acknowledge a growing awareness and commitment to ecological dimensions of theory and practice emerging among both practitioners and clients

Proposals for Implementing Values-Based Training, Examination, and Certification

In the past 3 years, we have made significant progress in opening up arrangements for examinations because of the interruption caused

by the global pandemic. From the outset, we have brought about changes that we see as permanent and not just strategies for managing the fallout of the pandemic. Consequently, there has been increased engagement with the examination system, and we know that there is “no turning back the clock.” We have taken significant steps toward values-based arrangements for examinations and the Training Endorsement Workshop (TEW). However, we have not addressed the general arrangements for professional education with these values in mind.

We announced several changes in a recent revision of the *IBOC Certification and Examinations Handbook*, the most important of which was to include a values statement to preface specific sections, including the TA 101, CTA, TSTA, and TEW.

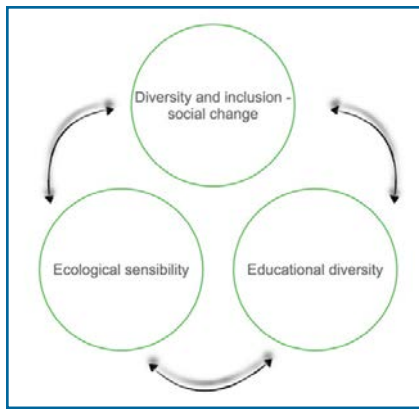


Figure 1: Core Values

Our intention is to signal that **our system needs to increasingly be congruent with our core values (Figure 1):**

The accreditation pathway for CTA and TSTA will be more tightly integrated with these three core values and will be integrated in an educational approach that encourages wider participation. We will do this partly by widening our system of accreditation to include formative assessment in addition to summative assessment methods.

In practical terms, including formative assessment will involve introducing reflection points at each stage of the TA accreditation pathway, reports of which will be incorporated into the summative/examination process. It will also mean exploring additional ways in which students can demonstrate competencies, for example, through establishing a portfolio of evidence alongside the current option of submitting extended academic writing. We are looking toward a time when students will be cocreating their education journey with peers, trainers, and principal supervisors.

A significant and substantial task will be to look at innovating the current arrangements for the CTA, which increases the potential for formative assessment. We see this as one of the key actions for PSC in the coming years.

Power and Authority in Professional Education

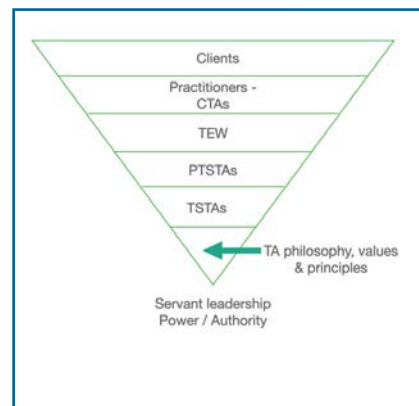


Figure 2: Power, Authority, and Servant Leadership

Running alongside our proposals to widen the reach of our system, we have been aware of the themes of power and authority in the educational domain and how this can limit as well as encourage a values-based approach. At the center of our vision is the role of the TSTA. In the recent revision of the *Handbook*, we have already indicated how we see the function of the TSTA moving away from that of an experienced senior trainer and supervisor and toward that of responsible leader in the professional community. The consequences of this are both subtle and significant for trainees, supervisees, practitioners, and clients. To envisage the shift in emphasis, we offer Figure 2, in which TSTAs occupy a “servant-leader” position.

We regard the relationship between practitioner and client as the primary point for promoting social change, inclusion, and diversity and ecolog-

ical impact. It is, arguably, the collective core business of transactional analysts across the four fields; it is what matters most. However, it is not the only point at which we want to advocate for our values. Practitioners also require and deserve support from those in the role of PTSTA. This group, in turn, can lean into support from those who hold the position of TSTA.

The intention of this reframing is to think more about how power and authority is understood. As we have stated in the *Handbook*, the role of the TSTA brings with it privilege and rank, which amounts to more than being competent in supervision and teaching. We will continue to set out how the emphasis on responsible leadership is integrated in TSTA preparation and examination. In the future, we look forward to a time when the rank of TSTA is more explicitly linked to community leadership, holds responsibility for the core philosophy and history of TA, and shows commitment to a values-based professional education system.

Reframing the Principle of Mutual Recognition

Finally, we want to share our current position on the issue of mutual recognition. We are keenly aware that we inherit a long-standing principle of mutual recognition across the arrangements of both ITAA and EATA. Such a principle was born out of a different time and different needs.

Our proposals for change are drafted during a time in which mutual recognition—meaning that both boards are the same—is gradually in decline. **There are many ways in which differences have emerged in the past few years, for example:**

- EATA's creation of a new certification of CTA Trainer, which is not recognized by the IBOC
- The IBOC TSTA teaching exam online, which is not fully recognized by EATA
- Marking of the written exam, with several differences between the two organizations
- EATA's exams are European and largely national; the IBOC's are international.
- Expansions and exceptions are different between the two organizations.
- In EATA, STAs and TTAs can sign CTA contracts; in the IBOC only TSTAs can sign CTA contracts.


We are also aware that the proposals outlined in this article are likely to create further differences in approach and technical requirements.

From the perspective of an international community, mutual recognition has led to those with less privilege adapting to a system of accreditation designed and operated by those with more power and privilege. Our proposals, while not complete or perfect, are steps toward addressing this imbalance.

We believe it would be in the best interests of members and trainers for there to be a clear acknowledgment that mutual recognition can no longer be assumed as meaning "being the same." Although there will be many who are initially apprehensive about this position, we sug-

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gest that it is a more honest statement of what is actually the case. It will enable our organizations to move into a healthier dynamic, one that might be described as "mutual differentiation rooted in mutual trust." In this scenario there would be a higher level of cooperation in exploring how the different organizations are developing accreditation systems on behalf of their respective trainers/trainees. It would allow

opportunities to learn from different experiences, to open up regional variation, and to explore radical possibilities to increase practitioner engagement in professional education. We do not believe that this is a movement of which to be fearful, but one to walk toward in the spirit of inquiry, mutual respect, and a love for what we might become as a professional community. 

IBOC News: Onsite CTA Exams Next Summer in Suffolk, UK!

The IBOC has successfully established a system for offering online examinations over the past couple of years, and these will remain a constant. However, it was made clear at the outset that this was not intended to eliminate the possibility of future in-person exams. Our intention is to create a template for further regional onsite exams post pandemic disruptions as a way of restoring some level of in-person examinations and professional gatherings.

The IBOC is, therefore, **pleased to announce an onsite, in-person CTA exam venue for 2023.** We will offer a maximum of 6 CTA exams connected with EdFest, a TA Festival in Suffolk, UK. A review of EdFest from last year is included in this edition of *The Script* so examiners and candidates can get a sense of this venue and event (see page 1).

The exam date is Thursday 27 July 2023, and details are on the website at www.itaaworld.org/training-and-certification-transactional-analysis. The exams will start with examiner and candidate meetings from 9am and will end late afternoon with a closing ceremony and celebration. The call for examiners will go out in January 2023. Meanwhile, please put the date on your calendar now if you wish to be involved.

The venue will be based on a farm rather than at a conference center/hotel. The intention in offering examinations in this smaller outdoor environment is to engage candidates and examiners who might not be best served by formal, large-scale, conference-based events or online formats. The date of the exams and festival is also intentionally set to coincide with the ITAA Annual General Membership (AGM) meeting to bring local and global together.

The deadline for application by candidates will be 27 April 2023. Candidates may apply if they have submitted their written exam at least 6 months prior to the oral exam date. When we have reached the maximum number of candidates for this exam event, we will announce that on the website.

We had a task team comprised of several board members, including Thorsten Geck, John Oates, Michelle Thome, and me as well as Michael Harsh from our finance committee. Each of us played an important part by bringing in our specialties as we considered various aspects of how each company works before we arrived at our final decision. I

appreciate the task team members' commitment as well as both of the AMCs in being available on short notice, sometimes at difficult times, for all the meetings, discussions, and interviews that we had during this process.

The task team met representatives from both AMCs, and the choice was not an easy one. Both offer a similar range of services, each with their unique offerings and possibilities. Susan and Lucy did a thorough job of screening, identifying, and selecting

the two finalists, and we found it incredibly hard to choose between them.

Ultimately, we unanimously agreed to partner with Huntington Association Management. This AMC (www.associationmanagement.biz) operates out of Pasadena, Southern California. Patricia Rosengren heads Huntington, and we experienced her as up front and effective, and we overall got a sense of the creativity that this organization will offer.

We have signed the contract (LOA) with Huntington Association Management, and the transition process of taking over from Susan Lockwood has begun. 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Evolving Directions for the TAJ

On 27 September 2022, 14 members of the editorial board of the *Transactional Analysis Journal (TAJ)* met online with the coeditor team and our managing editor, Robin Fryer, to discuss ongoing editorial practice. We had a rich and lively discussion, full of energy for the *Journal* going forward and with deep respect for the energy of contemporary TA theory and practice both across the globe and across all four fields of practice. It was a pleasure to meet with each other, united in our commitment to the *TAJ*.

One of the themes that emerged in the group discussions was around the academic tone of the *Journal*, which brought us to thinking as a group about accessibility on two different levels: first, regarding the “readability” of articles for readers who do not come from a conventional academic background or for whom English is a second language, and second, how to make the *Journal* more accessible for new writers or writers who lack academic confidence.

The first issue is one that taxes the coeditorial team on a regular basis. We have frequent discussions on how we maintain the rigor of our theory and writing while also

disrupting the typical conservative norms of a particular style of Western academic writing that can make some of the articles inaccessible to all but a small audience. As an editorial team, we wrestle with this question and maintain a commitment to publishing articles that embrace many different styles of writing in a bid to stay true to our TA commitment to accessible language as well as “ruthlessly high literary standards” (Berne, 1966, p. 194). We know, though, that there is still much work to be done in this area, and as a team we would like to address this concern in a future article encouraging authors to think more deeply about these issues.

In this article, however, we want to tackle the second issue, namely, how can we make the *Journal* more accessible to new writers. The coeditorial team had an enjoyable meeting brainstorming ideas about how to bring a “lighter” touch to the pages of the *Journal*, which may encourage new and inexperienced writers to put pen to paper and take a leap of faith in submitting work for publication.



First, we want to encourage people to write papers that are shorter than the usual 7000 words. The early days of the *TAJ* saw some very short, to-the-point papers, and we would like to resurrect this. Not all ideas need the deeper treatment that 7000 words provides, and so we welcome submissions of brief papers that perhaps serve as a spring board for ongoing development and discussion.

Second, we are interested in receiving submissions of different kinds of writing: interview pieces with figures in the field; reflective pieces of a more personal nature or subjective note such as the essays by Shadbolt (2022) and Beazley (2021) and the personal memoir style of Williams

(2021). Or perhaps a short respondent piece to a previously published article?

Finally, we are considering the option of a “first-time writers” column in which we publish a short piece from a first-time author, to whom we will offer extra support and editorial guidance.

These are a few of the possibilities the coeditors came up with. We would also be pleased to hear your thoughts on the kinds of writing you would like to see in the *Journal*, bearing in mind our ongoing commitment to intellectual and theoretical rigor. All submissions will continue to be subject to peer review. Our


hope is to shift the parameters of what we choose to publish without compromising the academic standards we have achieved over the decades. And finally, we remain welcoming of new full-length papers that offer either new ideas on a topic or new ways of thinking about TA theory in general.

Transactional Analysis and Politics

It has been 2 years since the special issue of *Psychotherapy and Politics International (PPI)* that we edited—devoted to articles authored by transactional analysts—was first published by Wiley. This year, PPI migrated to Tuwhera, an open access platform hosted by Auckland University of Technology. Now this issue is freely available [here](#).

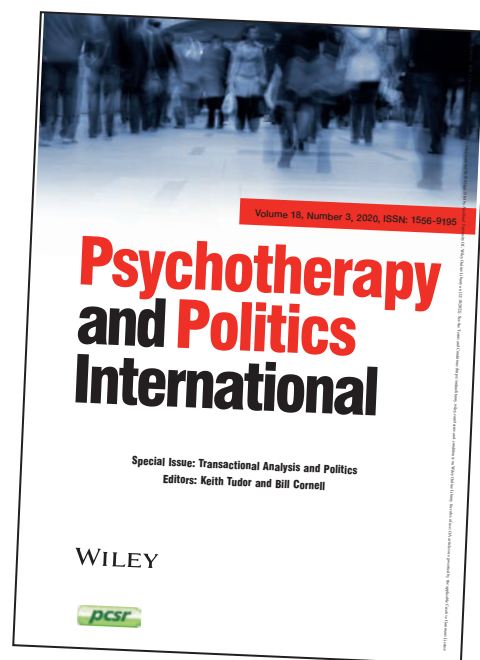
We wanted to let *Script* readers know about the free access because we think this special issue of PPI will be of compelling interest to transactional analysts around the world. It is unique in two ways. The first is that it is a complete—and very full—issue of a journal with published material grounded in TA but focused on political and social events in the world today. The second is that it is bookended by two profoundly political essays by Eric Berne, one never previously published (written during World War II) and the other written (immediately after the war) originally as an appendix to his first book, *The Mind in Action*. It was withdrawn by Berne from subsequent editions. In between, there are eight articles, two “Notes From the Front Line” (a special feature of PPI), and two reviews.

Inevitably, Berne’s hidden interest in war, power, and politics was a focus for us as we concluded the journal with a discussion reflecting on the broader meaning of the papers that comprise this issue. The articles, some written 2 years ago addressing the impact of COVID and immigration, remain highly relevant today. As we now witness the tragic Russian assault on Ukraine, the essays by Berne remind us of the timelessness of his thoughts on war and evil. Even more, Berne’s own silencing of his early writings is a startling example of a transgenerational process within the history of transactional analysis.


Those of us in the first generation of transactional analysts were given the explicit “rule,” an injunction we could say, from Berne that transactional analysis was not to be

involved with politics. While some of the more left-leaning members of the first generation—like Claude Steiner, the Gouldings, and Len Campos, among others—were actively political within the ITAA, most of us followed the rule even when we did not like it, keeping our

political activities for other arenas. It was only after the Berne archive became available and with the help of Terry Berne that we were able to understand Berne’s traumatic history at the hands of the United States government. We then realized what his silence actually represented. This issue of PPI brings Berne’s history out of the shadows and spotlights the very active and thoughtful engagement of transactional analysts in addressing political and social concerns. The conversation between the two of us that con-



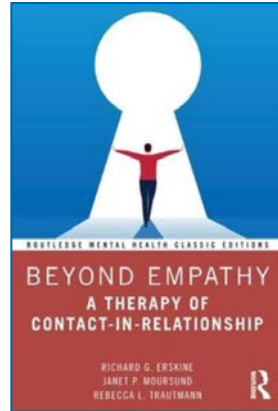
cludes the issue offers an important reflection on the meaning of Berne's drastic severing of his political thinking. It is wonderful news that this issue of *PPI* is now freely available.

Keith's own article in the issue, "Transactional Analysis and Politics: A Critical Review," demonstrates that, in spite of Berne's injunction against situating TA within political contexts, there has, in fact, been a substantial literature addressing social and political concerns from transactional analytic perspectives. Many transactional analysts have had strong social and political concerns, but it seems sadly clear that these were inhibited for many by the power of Berne's traumatically induced injunctions. We hope that this special issue will encourage others to come out of the shadows regarding politics and thinking, talking, and writing about the political world.

Richard Erskine, Janet Mour-sund, and Rebecca Trautmann's book *Beyond Empathy: A Therapy of Contact-in-Relationship* has been selected as one of the books in a new prestigious series entitled "Mental Health Classic Editions" published by Routledge. *Beyond Empathy: A Therapy of Contact-in-Relationship* provides an elaboration of Eric Berne's concept of OKness. The book offers trainees and experienced transactional analysts a methodology for assisting people in rediscovering their ability to maintain genuine relationships and, thus, better psychological health. The book's conversational style makes the theory and methods of a relationally based



psychotherapy come alive. This versatile approach to therapy is effective across a wide range of therapeutic situations, making this a valuable book for transactional analysts in both the mental health and human resource fields.

Elyane Alleysson has published a new book: *Langage symbolique des contes de fées et autres histoires* [*Symbolic Language of Fairy Tales and Other Stories*]. It was published in 2022 by ATSaé – Analyse Transactionnelle Savoirs Editis (www.atsae.fr). Fairy tales are part of the collective unconscious and in a metaphorical way talk about the profound difficulties that children experience during their growth. In her book, Elyane shares her view of the symbolic meaning of the characters and movements in the tales, with theoretical references to transactional analysis and its psychodynamic orientation. Among the tales discussed are "Little Thumb," "The Three Little Pigs," "Goldilocks and the Three Bears," "The Brave Little Goat of Monsieur Seguin," "The Three Feathers," and "The Brave Little Tailor."
